DUST AND DIRT

To clean your sash windows, use water and a soft brush. If there's a lot of dirt, household detergent can be used. You can use stronger cleaning products to remove greasy marks, but be careful, as some may damage the paintwork.

PAINTWORK

Damaged areas might appear on the window frames. Sand around the affected area, apply sealer, then prime, undercoat and topcoat. For smaller knocks, retouch the window with a matching paint colour. Avoid thick coats to reduce the chance of sticking.



SMOOTH OPERATION

After installation, you should open your windows a few times a day. After the first month, open them at least once a month. Always avoid forcing a sash to move as this can cause irreparable damage. Check any moving parts annually and lubricate them with light oil.

TIMBER VS UPVC

In the long run, timber sash windows are often cheaper than uPVC ones. When maintained properly, they last far longer, as it's easier to refresh their look with a new coat of paint. Wooden sash windows can also add astonishing value to a property when it comes to selling, as they are keenly sought after by homebuyers.



DOUBLE-GLAZED?
